The Resources and Ecosystems Sustainability, Tourist Opportunities, and Revived Economies of the Gulf Coast States Act of 2012, or RESTORE Act, and U.S. Department of Treasury's regulations direct Escambia County to prepare a Multi-Year Implementation Plan that prioritizes eligible activities for Direct Component funds awarded to the county through the Deepwater Horizon Settlement and RESTORE Act, and to obtain broad-based participation from individuals, businesses, Indian tribes and non-profit organizations as part of plan preparation.

The Escambia County Board of County Commissioners established the RESTORE Advisory Committee in 2012 to gain input from Escambia County citizens to develop a Needs Assessment, Selection Criteria and rank project submittals to the Project Portal. The BCC then shortlisted the following ten projects in February 2017 to include in the initial MYIP:

- Carpenter Creek Revitalization Plan
- Eleven Mile Creek Basin
- Eleven Mile Creek Restoration
- Hollice T. Williams Stormwater & Recreational Park
- OLF8 Commerce Park Improvements
- Perdido Key Gulf of Mexico Beach Access
- Perdido Key Multi-Use Path
- Project Universal Access
- SOAR with RESTORE
- South Dogtrack Drainage

In preparation of submitting the final MYIP, Escambia County is accepting public comment for a period of 45 days for those projects included within the plan.

The board authorized staff at the May 25, 2017 regular board meeting to conduct the 45 day public comment period. The public comment period will open June 5, 2017 and close July 19, 2017. On Monday, June 5 RESTORE staff will host a public comment kickoff meeting at 5:30 p.m. at the Central Office Complex (3363 West Park Place), Room 104.

Public comments can be submitted in the following ways:

On July 19 RESTORE staff will review the public comments submitted and incorporate them into the MYIP.

Next, Escambia County will submit the MYIP to the U.S. Treasury who will take 30 to 60 days to review and approve. The BCC anticipates voting to accept the approved MYIP in early September.

Approval of the MYIP allows Escambia County to begin individual grant applications for the projects. It is anticipated that final adoption of grant awards will occur in January 2018 with projects beginning shortly thereafter.

A 45-day period for public comments on Escambia County's more than \$8 million RESTORE Act multi-year implementation plan has started.

The plan is the county's first direct request for RESTORE Act funds. Under U.S. Treasury Department rules, the county must take public comments for 45 days before submitting the plan.

Congress passed the RESTORE Act to ensure all fees and fines BP paid the federal government for the 2010 oil spill would go to help the Gulf coast region.

Under the federal government's formula, Escambia County could receive up to \$70 million over the next 15 years, according to Chips Kirschenfeld, senior scientist and director of the Escambia County Natural Resources Management Department.

Kirschenfeld said the multi-year plan can be amended to add more projects over the 15-year period.

The county formed a RESTORE Act advisory committee in 2013 and reviewed and ranked 124 project proposals. Each county commissioner then selected two projects to be included in the first draft of the plan. Commissioners approved the plan in May.

The public will have until July 19 to comment on the proposals. People can comment by visiting the county's website at MyEscambia.com/Restore, emailing restore@myescambia.com or calling Escambia County Natural Resources Management Department at 595-3460.

The 10 projects approved by the Escambia County Board of County Commissioners are:

Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar Revitalization Plan: a request for \$1.3 million to develop a master plan for the restoration Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar.

Project Universal Access: a request for \$360,000 to evaluate and plan public beach access that complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Perdido Key Gulf of Mexico Public Access: a request for \$147,600 to plan and design new public access improvements on Perdido Key.

Perdido Key Multi-Use Path: a request for \$960,000 to construct 1 mile of the eastern portion of a bicycle and pedestrian path on Perdido Key. The Florida Department of Transportation is funding \$2.24 million for the construction of 2.44 miles of the western portion.

OLF8 Commerce Park Improvements: a request to fund \$1.5 million of master planning and design for a new commerce park that will be located at Outlying Field Site 8 if the county and Navy can agree on a land-swap deal.

South Dogtrack Drainage Project: a request to fund \$240,000 for planning and design to improve the drainage near Blue Angel Parkway and Dog Track Road.

Eleven Mile Creek Restoration: a request for \$1.33 million to plan the restoration and floodplain expansion.

Eleven Mile Creek Basin: a request for \$269,800 to plan and design stormwater improvement for the Eleven Mile Creek basin.

Hollice T. Williams Stormwater Park: a request for \$1.6 million for design and permitting for a dualuse stormwater basin and recreation park under Interstate 110.

SOAR with RESTORE: a request for \$900,000 to begin a workforce development program aimed at training underserved communities in environmental hazard remediation and cybersecurity.



Escambia County Gathering Input On Spending RESTORE Funds

Escambia County residents have until July 19 to weigh in on how the more than \$8 million in RESTORE Act money should be spent.

The 45-day public comment period is mandated under U.S. Treasury Department rules, in regard to ten projects that have been culled from the 124 submitted to the County Commission.

"There were great projects; I mean there was not a single bad project. Some of them were simply better than others," said Escambia County Commissioner Grover Robinson who has been the county's point man on the Deepwater Horizon disaster since the explosion and spill in 2010.

"Some of them impacted more things; some of them were more tied, had a nexus to the oil spill than others," said Robinson.

An Escambia County advisory committee was set up in 2013 to review and rank the proposals. The five commissioners then selected two projects each for their districts, and the plan was approved last month.

One of Robinson's District-4 projects is the cleanup and restoration of Carpenter's Creek.

"[Carpenter's Creek] certainly goes in both the county and city [of Pensacola]," Robinson said. "I think it's a fairly important project overall, also to the environmental health of Bayou Texar as we move forward."

The other project from District-4 is developing access for handicapped visitors to the water front at Pensacola Beach, in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Robinson came up with that idea while visiting Park City, Utah.

"Park City is a leader in dealing with disabilities and skiing, and people come from all over the world to ski at Park City," said Robinson. "Because someone in their family may have some disability. And I think the same thing happens with seashore visits."

Other projects in this round of ten include: Eleven Mile Creek Restoration, and \$900,000 for "SOAR with RESTORE" -- a workforce development program to train underserved communities in environmental hazard remediation and cybersecurity.

Elsewhere, the National Wildlife Federation released its report in April, listing 50 priority projects for Gulf Restoration.

Ryan Fikes, a biologist with the Federation, says two involve Pensacola Bay, and Apalachicola Bay.

"In Pensacola Bay, we really focused on projects that target stream restoration and shoreline marsh restoration," said Fikes. "In Apalachicola Bay, projects that look at fresh water influx, getting water circulating adequately, as well as oyster restoration."

In the case of Apalachicola Bay's oyster beds, and the seafood industry they provide, the projects can be both environmental, and economic.

"As we restore and enhance natural coaster resources, and rebuild the natural coastal environment, our Gulf Coast really depends on so highly upon that for recreation, tourism, and just for our way of life in the Gulf Coast region," said Fikes.

The Wildlife Federation has been active in restoring the Gulf of Mexico since Hurricane Katrina decimated much of the wetlands in Louisiana. But Fikes says they do not directly tout projects for funding out of the numerous pots of money the oil spill has produced.

"We've really helped work initially to do things like pass the RESTORE Act via those funds, and a few other sources," Fikes said. "We've really tried to champion the best restoration project that actually help us to address the restoration needs in our five Gulf states."

Escambia County could receive up to \$70 million over the next 15 years from RESTORE. But Escambia County's Grover Robinson is thinking about higher numbers.

"I would like to see us only spend Phase-I monies on those projects, and be able to leverage additional monies from outside the area," said Robinson. "So that we can come back and pick additional projects for Phase-I. If we simply use that 70 million, then we didn't do a good enough job. We need to take that 70 million and turn it into \$350 million."

10 oil spill RESTORE projects in Pensacola seek \$8.6M approval

More than \$8 million worth of public infrastructure projects in Pensacola could soon be ready to move forward as they seek approval from the federal government.

The 10 projects, which vary from a 1.3-mile greenway park beneath Interstate 110 near downtown Pensacola to planning for a massive commerce park adjacent to the \$1 billion Navy Federal Credit Union campus, are set to be funded from fines resulting from the 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

Escambia County residents have until July 19 to provide public comment on the proposed projects. The 45-day public comment period that began this month is mandated by the rules of the Resources and Ecosystem Sustainability, Tourist Opportunities, and Revived Economies of the Gulf Coast Act (RESTORE Act) passed in the wake of the spill in 2012. The RESTORE Act allocates 80 percent of the Clean

Water Act penalties resulting from the oil spill to the Gulf Coast Restoration Trust Fund, which is comprised of five funding components including the Direct Component which provides funds directly to each of 23 Gulf Coast Florida counties.



One of the proposed projects set to receive funding is the Hollice T. Williams Greenway and Stormwater Park, which is estimated to cost more than \$4 million. (City of Pensacola/Special to The Pulse)

As part of the established funding agreement, each of the 23 eligible Florida counties must submit a Multi-year Implementation Plan (MYIP) with proposed projects to the U.S. Treasury, where they will face final approval.

Officials said this month that the \$8.6 million in projects facing approval are just the beginning of nearly \$71 million that's expected to come to Escambia County over the next 14 years.

In 2012, the Escambia County Board of County Commissioners established the citizens RESTORE Advisory Committee to establish criteria, review, and rank 124 separate project proposals. Last year, the five commissioners chose two projects each for their districts to be included in the multi-year implementation plan.

Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar Revitalization: Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar are a local treasure in an urban watershed. Although portions of the creek and bayou remain in a relatively natural state, they are heavily impacted by the adjacent developed areas and have experienced environmental degradation over the past 70+ years. Urban encroachment around Carpenter Creek has reduced riparian buffers leading to increased erosion rates and flooding, increased stormwater runoff, and reduced water quality and clarity. However, these past impacts make Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar the ideal candidate for restoration. By developing a Master Plan, Escambia County will be able to identify priority actions to improve water quality and wildlife habitat while enhancing public greenspaces right in the heart of Pensacola. Eleven Mile Creek Stream Restoration: A project in the neighboring Perdido Bay watershed, the Eleven Mile Creek Stream Restoration will restore wetlands, remove invasive species, and establish riparian buffers that provide wildlife habitat as well as flood protection. Water quality improvements are also needed to address the degradation of Eleven Mile Creek, which is a 303(d) listed impaired waterbody with Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) for numerous impairments such as fecal coliform bacteria, low dissolved oxygen, excess nutrients and other contaminants. This comment is to draw attention to the fact that it is imperative that Project 86- Town of Century Water Quality Project should be added to this short list of projects during this MYIP draft stage. The Water Quality Improvement Project nominated for Century is about improving the treatment of the waste from the treatment plant the effluent that goes into the Escambia River, our watershed. Lack of such repairs/replacements could potentially have major adverse consequences throughout the county - think water pollution that effects water quality, swimmers, fish, biota, recreational activities, eco-tourism, tourism, public health and welfare and so forth. The proposed project will enhance and protect the water quality in the Escambia River and Upper Escambia Bay. It is much more economical and effective to reduce pollutants at the source than to try and improve water quality at the other end. This project fixes the source of water quality impairments and is very much in the best interests of most if not all citizens of Escambia County whether or not they are aware of the problem. The Clean Water Act is about preventing pollution, point and non point. This project is in perfect alignment of what the Restore Act money is to be used for. This is a valid prudent need in Escambia County. This treats the waste from the Century Correctional Facility which houses many of Escambia's prisoners not just the wastewater for the small town. I am bringing it to the attention of Escambia County the dire circumstances surrounding this location and the needs that this project addresses should not be overlooked nor ignored. Please add it to the list. As part of my comment I am adding this from a letter attached to the project: "RE: Town of Century Water Quality Improvements Project The Escambia County Water Quality & Land Management Division supports the Town of Century Water Quality Improvements Project. This project will replace four wastewater lift stations that have exceeded their useful life, upgrade and replace existing wa	Joan Carnley
The "Town of Century Water Quality Improvements Project" that was submitted two years ago did not make the shortlist of projects to be included in the initial MYIP. While I realize that there were many credible projects submitted and not all can make the shortlist, I respectfully ask that the RESTORE Staff and the BOCC take a closer look at this project. You may find that it warrants being added to the shortlist or funded sooner in some other manner. This project was important when submitted two years ago and is now imperative. The Town of Century is in great need of water and wastewater infrastructure improvements. Since submission of the project, the wastewater system equipment and infrastructure have further deteriorated requiring frequent repairs/maintenance. Funding for this project is direly needed to replace wastewater lift stations; to repair or replace existing water supply equipment and wastewater treatment equipment; and, to repair leaking and overflowing sewers. Many of the	Harold Carnley

problems involve equipment that was put into place with the wastewater plant in 1991 that is failing due to age. At least \$430,000 to fix "critical" problems with the water and wastewater facilities is needed now. These critical repairs include \$80,000 in wastewater plant fixes and \$150,000 in the wastewater collection system. The wells also need \$200,000 in critical repairs. These are just the "critical" repairs needed now. Without funding for the proposed project, other equipment and infrastructure will also reach critical status sooner rather than later. For more details about these and other issues, you may want to speak with Alicia Jernigan, Century's certified wastewater operator, as well as with Mayor Hawkins and Town Council members. I'm neither an environmental engineer nor a scientist, but I do understand that failing to repair and replace this equipment and infrastructure can and may very well produce devastating results throughout a large part of Escambia County. The proposed project will enhance and protect the water quality in the Escambia River and Upper Escambia Bay by improving the quality of the point source discharge of the Town's wastewater treatment plant. It will also improve the River and Bay water quality by eliminating or greatly reducing sewer system overflows caused by ageing/unreliable equipment and infiltration/inflow into the sewer collection system which adversely effects the efficiency of the wastewater treatment facility. The consequences of not funding this project are dire and effects most of the county. On the surface, this project is not as pretty or fun as building another beach access, a multiuse path or additional parking, but failing to fund this project soon could have far-reaching adverse effects that quickly overshadow some other projects that are on the shortlist. This project is very much in the best interest of most if not all citizens of Escambia County whether or not they are aware of the problem. I urge you to seriously look into this and to find the funds to help Century fix this now or add this project to the short list and ensure it gets funded by RESTORE. Thank you. I hope that those who really care about what benefits the citizens of the county as a whole, and are in a position to make a decision regarding this matter, realize the importance of this project proposal. This project does not benefit just a few in select neighborhoods, whether they be poor or wealthy, but nearly the entire county. If the Escambia River system and the Upper Escambia Bay is allowed to be further polluted that hurts more than just a few, has far reaching adverse consequences, and our elected officials will be held responsible. Two of the projects on the initial MYIP - SOAR with Restore and Perdido Key Multi-Use Path were ranked lower than the Water Quality Improvements Project. Re: National Wildlife Federation's Comments on Escambia County's Draft Multi-Year Implementation Plan (MYIP)

Dear Mr. Kirschenfeld,

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF) is the nation's largest conservation organization, and we are dedicated to protecting wildlife and their habitats and inspiring a future generation of conservationists. On behalf of our more than six million members and supporters nationally, including hundreds of Escambia County residents, we appreciate the opportunity to submit comments on Escambia County's Multi-Year Implementation Plan (MYIP).

Working with our state partner, the Florida Wildlife Federation, we have been on the ground, making the case for comprehensive Gulf restoration in the wake of the 2010 BP oil spill. NWF worked towards the passage of the RESTORE Act, and since then we have supported **the investment of dollars resulting from the oil spill in ecological restoration projects that benefit the Gulf's economy, with an emphasis on coastal and watershed protection**. Our Florida policy specialist has been closely following as Florida's 23 Gulf Coast Counties consider projects to fund with their Direct Component funds available through the RESTORE Act, as they develop Multi-Year Implementation Plans (MYIP).

Working with a coalition of organizations in Florida, NWF and its partners crafted a restoration framework with project outcomes and guiding principles (outlined in a July 18, 2017 comment letter, and attached as an appendix). We encourage Escambia County to keep these themes in mind while planning and implementing restoration activities.

NWF has reviewed Escambia County's MYIP, and offers the following comments on the two main components of the MYIP: **Process** and **Projects**.

PROCESS:

In 2014, the U.S. Treasury Department issued their "Direct Component Guidance and Application to Receive Federal Financial Assistance". This Guidance provides critical context for ensuring an effective process. NWF believes that Escambia County has <u>exceeded</u> the basic requirements outlined in the Treasury Guidance (specifically, the inclusion of the Matrix, Map, Narrative, and 45-day Public Comment). The public engagement process was inclusive, accessible, and transparent. The public was afforded numerous opportunities to contribute information at multiple steps of the process, from the development of a Community-based Needs Assessment, to a project-scoring system, to the project

solicitation process, to project selection, and to opportunities to comment on the MYIP. Escambia County also developed numerous on-line tools such as website, project submittal portal, web-based project descriptions with detailed information on all 124 projects submitted for consideration, and a project feedback form. The MYIP itself is also informative and user-friendly. NWF applauds Escambia County for their outstanding processes.

PROJECTS:

The Gulf Coast's economy and way of life are deeply entwined with the health of the land and water. The fines and penalties from the Deepwater Horizon disaster have great potential to restore and protect the Gulf of Mexico's lands, waters, wildlife, communities, and economy. NWF believes that recovery monies should be spent in a science-driven, transparent process that ensures a healthy Gulf of Mexico for wildlife as well as for future generations.

NWF supports the **Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar Revitalization** Project, and we even included this project as one of our 50 restoration priorities across the Gulf in our 2017 report – <u>Making the</u> <u>Most of Restoration: Priorities for a Recovering Gulf</u>. We also support the **Eleven Mile Creek Stream Restoration** and acknowledge elements of other projects that will provide natural resource benefits.

Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar Revitalization: Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar are a local treasure in an urban watershed. Although portions of the creek and bayou remain in a relatively natural state, they are heavily impacted by the adjacent developed areas and have experienced environmental degradation over the past 70+ years. Urban encroachment around Carpenter Creek has reduced riparian buffers leading to increased erosion rates and flooding, increased stormwater runoff, and reduced water quality and clarity. However, these past impacts make Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar the ideal candidate for restoration. By developing a Master Plan, Escambia County will be able to identify priority actions to improve water quality and wildlife habitat while enhancing public greenspaces right in the heart of Pensacola. Natural resource restoration projects in Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar will provide critical buffers for streams and waterways, enhance riparian areas, improve water quality, and restore wildlife habitat. Such actions will improve ecological functions and provide long-term benefits to the creek itself, as well as to Pensacola Bay. Once the MYIP is finalized and approved, NWF encourages Escambia County to move forward quickly with the Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar project application. We also encourage Escambia County to invest future funds in implementing key restoration activities in Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar.

Eleven Mile Creek Stream Restoration: A project in the neighboring Perdido Bay watershed, the Eleven Mile Creek Stream Restoration will restore wetlands, remove invasive species, and establish riparian buffers that provide wildlife habitat as well as flood protection. Water quality improvements are also needed to address the degradation of Eleven Mile Creek, which is a 303(d) listed impaired waterbody with Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) for numerous impairments such as fecal coliform bacteria, low dissolved oxygen, excess nutrients and other contaminants. NWF supports the restoration of approximately 3,500 linear feet of stream and 40 acres of wetland floodplain.

Additionally, NWF supports the ecological restoration elements of three other projects: **South Dogtrack Drainage Project**, **Eleven Mile Creek Basin**, and **Hollice T. Williams Stormwater Park**. NWF commends Escambia County for including many projects in its MYIP that will lead to important ecological improvements in the county, and NWF asks the County to continue to prioritize and

develop projects that can provide strong ecological benefits while supporting economic gains to the local community.

Conclusion:

We applaud Escambia County for their efforts to select projects and develop a draft MYIP. NWF appreciates that Escambia County has implemented a very inclusive public engagement process. NWF supports many of the projects in the MYIP – especially the selection of **Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar Revitalization** – and optimistically anticipate Escambia County employing the same level of public participation and transparent approach with future installments of Direct Component funding. We also hope to see a similar focus on ecological restoration, and we encourage Escambia County to take a larger-scale approach, focusing on just a few, impactful projects. We recommend this large-scale, ecological approach with not just future Direct Component funds, but also other RESTORE Act funds, as the health of the Gulf ecosystem drives its economy.

Dear Commission Chair Underhill and County Commissioners,

On behalf of Defenders of Wildlife, please accept these comments concerning the approval of the Escambia County RESTORE Act Direct Component Multi-Year Implementation Plan. Founded in 1947, Defenders of Wildlife is a national non-profit conservation organization focused solely on wildlife and habitat conservation and the safeguarding of biodiversity. Defenders of Wildlife has over 5,500 members and supporters in Escambia County and over 80,000 in Florida. Defenders is actively monitoring the BP oil spill restoration planning activities of Florida's northern Gulf coast counties including Escambia County.

We hope you please keep in mind that the oil spill was first and foremost an environmental disaster. In adopting the County's Multi-Year Implementation Plan (MYIP), we strongly encourage the County to select projects with sustainable, long-term benefits to Escambia County's natural resources, ecosystems, fisheries, marine and wildlife habitats, beaches and coastal wetlands. We believe that projects that restore or improve water quality and fish and wildlife habitat will best insure Escambia County continues to enjoy abundant fish and wildlife, inviting beaches and waters, a healthy environment and a strong economy and tourism industry over the long-term. Projects such as these will help eliminate nutrients from entering your coastal waters and avoid the algae blooms that have ravaged estuaries on south Florida's east and west coasts.

We encourage the County to adopt an MYIP based on the currently available allocations for projects which provide the greatest sustainable environmental and economic benefits. Defenders of Wildlife recommends the adopted MYIP include the following projects:

- 1. Carpenter Creek Revitalization Plan
- 2. Eleven Mile Creek Basin

- 3. Eleven Mile Creek Restoration
- 4. Hollice T. Williams Stormwater and Recreational Park
- 5. Perdido Key Gulf of Mexico Public Access
- 6. Perdido Key Multi-Use Path
- 7. South Dogtrack Drainage Project

We encourage you to not to approve the OLF8 project as is does not restore or improve water quality and fish and wildlife habitat. Unlike the other projects we are supporting, the OLF8 project will not result in sustainable, long-term benefits to Escambia County's ecosystems, wildlife habitats and environmentally-friendly beach access.

Escambia County's quality of life and economy are tied to the health of its bays and their watersheds. Re: Comments on Escambia County's Draft Multi-Year Implementation Plan (MYIP)

Dear Mr. Kirschenfeld,

Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments on Escambia County's Draft Multi-Year Implementation Plan (MYIP).

Our collective organizations (Audubon Florida, Defenders of Wildlife, Florida Wildlife Federation, National Wildlife Federation, Ocean Conservancy, and The Nature Conservancy) represent nearly 100,000 members and supporters along Florida's Gulf Coast, several of whom are Escambia County residents. Working together as a coalition as well as within our individual organizations and chapters, we have been advocating for Gulf restoration that is comprehensive, and targets watersheds for protection of coastal and marine resources. Our collaboration began with the crafting and passage of the RESTORE Act and is now focused on ensuring the best allocation of restoration funds.

In anticipation of the diverse perspectives on how to spend restoration funds, our groups collaborated to develop a framework, including comprehensive restoration principles and outcomes, designed to inform project selection and Multi-Year Implementation Plans (MYIP). We encourage Escambia County to consider these themes throughout the planning and implementation of both current and future restoration activities.

A successful MYIP should have four key project outcomes: environmental impact, fisheries management, wildlife resource enhancement and community resiliency.

The cornerstone of a strong MYIP should be careful consideration of **environmental impact**; we are pleased to see that the Escambia County MYIP has focused on this element. A MYIP should include projects that protect water quality and wildlife habitat, and provide the public with environmentally sustainable outdoor recreation opportunities. The Plan should promote restoration, health and sustainability of coastal habitats, fisheries, marine resources and vulnerable species. Projects included in the MYIP should work together to maximize environmental benefits. Most importantly, the plan should not include projects that would result in further damage to the Gulf ecosystems. MYIPs should include regional projects that advance priorities toward achieving identified restoration goals that enhance

watersheds and estuaries along the Gulf Coast. We are pleased to see Escambia County address environmental impacts in its proposed projects, especially Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar Revitalization and Eleven Mile Creek Stream Restoration, as well as South Dogtrack Drainage Project, Eleven Mile Creek Basin, and Hollice T. Williams Stormwater Park.

The MYIP should also consider the sustainability and health of its **commercial and recreational fisheries**, building in projects that protect and restore habitats and estuaries, and remove threats to fisheries such as marine debris and invasive species.

In addition, the MYIP should prioritize **wildlife resource enhancement** as a means to ensure healthier communities and a thriving nature-based economy. We anticipate Carpenter Creek and Bayou Texar Revitalization and Eleven Mile Creek Stream Restoration will enhance wildlife resources.

Another key project outcome is enhanced **community resiliency.** Investments in projects that will enhance resiliency may reduce the impact of hurricanes and other disasters. Restoring and protecting marshes, wetlands, reefs and other coastal habitats also mitigate storm surge, erosion and coastal flooding, further reducing the costs of insurance and disaster relief, which may be addressed with several of the planning projects already mentioned.

In order to efficiently and effectively achieve these outcomes, we encourage several guiding principles for project selection: science-based metrics and evaluation, phased approach to implementation, clear outcomes, local input/participation, leverage opportunities, and mutual project compatibility. We are pleased that Escambia County MYIP appears to have considered some of these principles, based on the criteria used to establish MYIP priorities.

Employing the guiding principle of **science-based evaluation** is instrumental to proper project selection and plan development. Every project should be evaluated across a broad metrics of science-based criteria. In addition, project implementation should be monitored and subject to an ongoing review process to ensure short and long-term goals are being met, allocated funds are being spent responsibly and projects are performing and managed adaptively. We applaud Escambia County for developing a Best Available Science tool.

Furthermore, project descriptions should state clear, measurable and achievable ecological and community **outcomes**. Making these outcomes understood by the public and stakeholder groups, and providing opportunities for meaningful input into project selection and evaluation increases public confidence in the success of these projects and will elicit more public support.

Counties should consider ways to **leverage** resources across RESTORE funding allocations and as a match for other local, state and federal funding sources, and we were pleased to see Escambia County's approach designed to initiate planning and then identify other

funding sources for implementation. Escambia County should also seek to achieve **mutual project compatibility** to ensure that discrete projects are not inadvertently working at odds with one another. Accordingly, it would be beneficial for a panel of resource and economic managers to provide oversight and ensure project designs avoid unintended impacts to key resources that are also restoration targets.

The ultimate success of the RESTORE Act rests on selecting and implementing integrated ecological restoration projects, consistent with state-wide plans, and rigorous application of criteria to ensure that only the best and most appropriate projects are funded. We feel these themes have been well considered in projects proposed in the published MYIP and encourage Escambia County to continue to keep these themes in mind in planning and implementing future restoration activities.

We applaud Escambia County for its efforts to prepare a Draft MYIP. We respectfully request Escambia County to consider our comments and incorporate them as appropriate into both the current Draft MYIP, as well as in future MYIPs (which may be prepared as additional RESTORE Act funds become available).
