The RESTORE Act

- Dedicates 80% of Clean Water Act civil and administrative penalties from the *Deepwater Horizon* oil spill to the Gulf Coast Restoration Trust Fund
- Uncertainty exists around the ultimate amount and timing of funds.
- To Date: Transocean has agreed to pay \$1 billion in civil penalties for violating the Clean Water Act in the *Deepwater Horizon* oil spill.

GULF RESTORATION COUNCIL

Composition:

- Six Federal members (Agriculture, Army, Commerce, EPA, the Interior, Homeland Security)
- Five Gulf Coast States (Alabama, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas)
- Chair: Department of Commerce

CHALLENGES

- Uncertainty exists around the ultimate amount and timing of available funding;
- Current Fiscal Environment;
- Department of Treasury Regulations in development;
- Gulf Coast States in the process of developing State Expenditure Plans;
- Need to solicit additional public input.

DRAFT INITIAL COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

- Establishes five overarching Restoration Goals;
- Describes how the Council will solicit, evaluate, and fund projects and programs;
- Describes the process for approval of State Expenditure Plans;
- Contains a preliminary list of "authorized but not commenced" projects;
- Identifies the Council's Next Steps.



OVERARCHING GOALS

- 1. Restore and Conserve Habitat
- 2. Restore Water Quality
- 3. Replenish and Protect Living Coastal and Marine Resources
- 4. Enhance Community Resilience
- 5. Restore and Revitalize the Gulf Economy



- General guidance on types of projects and programs the Council will fund;
- 2. Evaluation Criteria;
- 3. Selection Process.



STATE EXPENDITURE PLANS – SPILL IMPACT COMPONENT

- Eligible activities are broader in scope than 1. **Council-Selected Restoration Component;**
- Describes the expected content of State 2. **Expenditure** Plans;
- 3. Recognizes that each Gulf Coast State is unique and may have distinct priorities;
- Sets out basic parameters for Council Approval of 4. State plans.

NEXT STEPS

- 1. Refine Objectives and Criteria;
- 2. Advisory Committee(s);
- 3. Set forth regulation for "Bucket 3";
- 4. Select and publish a Funded Priorities List.

Public Comment

- 1. 30-day Public Comment Period
- 2. Listening sessions in all 5 States
- 3. Welcome input and feedback
- 4. Asking for specific feedback on Criteria and Objectives

- Should the Council develop additional criteria for consideration now or in the future? If so, what should they be?

- Similarly, should the Council eliminate any of the Objectives?
- How should the Council prioritize its restoration Objectives?

- Should the Council establish any advisory committees?
- If so, what type of advisory committees should the Council establish? How should the Council structure such advisory committees? What role should such advisory committees play?
